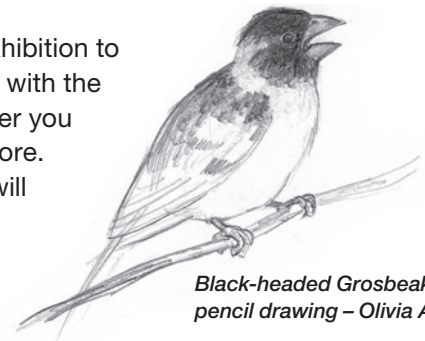

Henry Cowell Redwoods State Park

Saturday, May 13, 8:00 AM – 4:00 PM

Henry Cowell Redwoods State Park is located in the Santa Cruz Mountains and is most famous for the 40 acre grove of towering old-growth redwood trees. This mountain habitat offers species we do not get on the valley floor including Allen's Hummingbirds, Pileated Woodpeckers, Swainson's Thrush, Wilson's Warbler, Black-throated Gray Warbler, Brown Creeper and Pacific Wren. Biologist Ryan Phillips will help Lisa co-lead this tour. Call the store to reserve your seat. **\$65 and includes park entrance fee and transportation.**

New Workshop!

Breeding Season in the Bay Area with Biologist Ryan Phillips

Saturday, June 10, 8:00 AM – 12:30 PM

This is a new workshop based on the breeding time activities that happen right here in the Bay Area. Many different species arrive each spring in order to raise young and will depart by fall. Valuable information has been collected throughout the decades which help us monitor the health of a species and how and where they raise young. Participants will receive a copy of the Santa Clara County Breeding Bird Atlas.

Santa Cruz Hot Spots

Saturday, July 8 - 8:00 AM – 4:00 PM

We will head to the coast and spend the day birding in and around Natural Bridges State Beach. Natural Bridges is known for its fall concentration of Monarch Butterflies. While this is not the time of year to find these beautiful butterflies, it's a great time to find birds enjoying the breeding season along the coast. There is a lot of habitat to explore from meadows to coastline, as a result we will see a variety of species. Biologist Ryan Phillips and Lisa will co-lead this tour. **Fee: \$65 and includes entrance fees & transportation.**

Raptor Workshop #2 with Biologist Ryan Phillips

Planned for August, 8:00 AM – 12:30 PM

Back by popular demand, Raptor expert Ryan Phillips will concentrate on the summer time activities of Northern California's breeding raptors. We will meet in the south San Jose birding hot spot known as Coyote Valley Open Space. Carpooling will be encouraged. Ryan will discuss the different raptor families - eagles, buteos, accipiters, harriers and falcons. 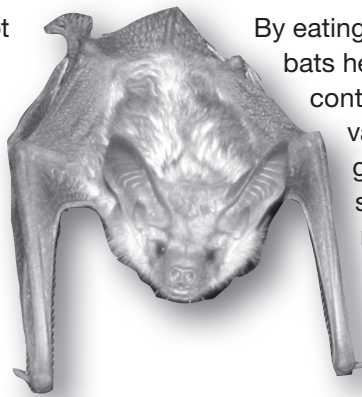


Birds are what the Los Gatos Birdwatcher is all about, but we also love bats!

Like birds, bats too can fly, but they are not related to birds at all. They are mammals just like us. In fact there are over 1200 species of bats which means a ¼ of the world's mammals are bats. We wanted you to know about a 2017 Senate Bill to make the "Pallid Bat" the California State Bat. Naming the pallid bat as the official state bat of California will promote an appreciation of the benefits of bats, more education about their ecological roles, and more conservation for bats in this state. Bats are found in different habitats all over the world and come in different sizes and colors. Some bats eat fruit and some feed on nectar; playing an important part in pollinating plants. Fortunately for us, many bats prefer to eat insects. Hundreds of insects are consumed by bats every night which helps us rid our surroundings of unwanted insects without the need for pesticides. Bats are beneficial and should not be feared. At the Los Gatos Birdwatcher we even sell bat houses you can put up in your garden. Bat houses provide a safe place for bats to sleep during the day.

Bats help agriculture in California

Bats provide an estimated 3.7 billion dollars' worth of pest control management for U.S. Agriculture (Boyes et al. 2011), much of which is located in California. The University of California (UC) Davis researchers are working with walnut growers to help determine the economic value of the bats' pest control management for California farmers.



By eating so many flies, wasps, and mosquitoes, bats help reduce the numbers of bugs that contribute to health risks. Pallid bats eat a variety of insects and arthropods including grasshoppers, moths, beetles, spiders, scorpions, and centipedes. And bats nursing their young, known as "pups" eat up to two thirds to all of their body weight in insects and arthropods every night. That means hundreds and hundreds of insects!

Pallid bat description

Pallid bats are relatively large bats compared with other bats in California. They are light colored, and have fairly long ears. There are two subspecies in California, the large one being the Pacific pallid bat found almost exclusively in California, and the smaller one being the desert pallid bat), found throughout much of the U.S. southwest desert.

Pallid bat ecology

Pallid bats are crevice roosting bats and spend their daytime in the crevices of rocks, cavities of trees and behind bark, and occasionally in barns, bridges, and other suitable structures. Females typically have 1 or 2 young per year and are expected to live for 10 to 15 or more years in the wild.

- **Feeder Cleaning** – We want to help you maintain a healthy environment for your backyard birds. That is why we offer this service to clean feeders on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Bring your feeder into the store in the morning and we'll have it ready before closing. While we clean feeders for free we do ask that you consider making a minimum donation of \$5 per feeder to one of the Bay Area charities we support. You'll find collection boxes at the store.

- **Frequent Buyer Program** – Buy 9 of the same seed bags of 20# or higher at full price and get the 10th bag free. Coupons do not apply.

- **Outreach to community organizations about birding.** We have educational programs about birds and birding, ideal for gardening and other service groups. We can also do "show & tell" of the many items we carry in the store.

- **Backyard Bird Consulting Program** – We will come out to your home and talk about what you can do to attract more birds to your yard. What species you can attract, where to set-up feeders, bird baths and nest boxes are just some of the topics we'll cover. There is a \$25 consultation fee per visit. With your visit you'll receive a \$10 Los Gatos Birdwatcher gift certificate.

- We offer **Gift Certificates** and complimentary gift wrapping.
