Another “First on our Ridge”

Years ago we had a very unusual Northern Harrier fly over our ridge in the Santa Cruz Mountains. They are marsh birds and I can only surmise that, in order to get to the Bay, he had to go over the mountain. That was the first “First on our Ridge” article.

Here’s the second. I had just come in from walking Augie on Sunday evening, June 2. In a very loud whisper, John was commanding me to hurry up, to come see a ROSE-BREASTED GROSBEAK at the feeder outside the living room window. Yes, I hurried and was able to see white triangles on either side

of the tail with white above black flying away. I had to look it up to make sure. YES! Now, would he come back? These birds are not supposed to be here even though customer, Linda Sullivan, had a first-year male over



winter this past year and Lani Christiansen had one at her feeder many years ago. Out came the binoculars and I sat waiting for our new bird to come back, and back he came. Of course, he landed on the back of the Squirrel Buster Plus so all I saw was his pale, translucent beak cracking those black-oiled sunflower seeds. Then he moved forward. His armpits were rosy! To prevent the band-tailed pigeons from landing on the Buster Plus, we have the perches screwed in and they are just a little short for this guy and he was fluttering to keep his balance. He must feel right at home with his many cousins, the black-headed grosbeaks. The babies have started doing the “doo-wop” song of “WeeeOooooo.” Even though nesting season seems to be done, the adult males are still singing loudly and eating an amazing amount of seed. All thirteen feeders are filled every other day instead of the normal twice a week.

The most bizarre part of this story is that the day before, we went to Almaden Lake Park in search of the rose-breasted grosbeak that had been seen there all week. Expert birder, Janna Pauser, heard and saw it briefly but the rest of our large group didn’t see it. We had other great birds like Western tanagers, hooded orioles, red-shouldered hawks, but not the rose-breasted grosbeak. Never did I think that one would fly up to 2700 feet to our feeder. Must be that great seed! Sadly, he didn’t come back for a second visit.

Surfing Steller's Jay, USA!



Long-time customer, Laura Czinski, came in with her iPhone to show me something hysterical happening in their backyard fountain. She explained that she and her family had been watching a Steller's jay nest that the parents had built at the top of the brick-sided part of their house. Steller's jays make their nests with twigs and grasses like Western scrub jays, but they add mud to it so that the cup where the babies are is more solid than just twigs. The first photo she showed me was of the nest and the four blue speckled eggs (photo 1). Next were the little bare-skinned babies all huddled together (photo 2). The third, rather triumphant photo, was of the babies out of the nest, standing on the brick wall, calling to their parents to FEED ME!



After these photos came the video! All four babies had taken up surfing in their backyard fountain. So that the babies had a way of drinking out of the fountain, Laura's husband, Ron, put a foot long piece of wood in the fountain and the babies took turns landing and, then, riding the board to the other side. The included photo shows the bird on the plank, but it loses in translation. To watch them maneuver the board to the other side by moving their bodies and their wings is pretty amazing. Laura wrote in the accompanying email that "They provide endless entertainment! All four babies are still here hanging out and playing. I've seen them play "tag" with each other."



"Surfing" is a bit anthropomorphizing but it is amazing what birds do when you watch them on a continual basis. This year has been over the top with baby activity. Seed sales were down and then, in late May, shot through the roof. Suet sales, which last year peeked in April, went wacko in June this year. I know that it is frustrating if we are out of something when you come in to purchase seed or suet on a Sunday/Monday. When I order seed, I use the previous weeks usage and order as a guide. If the birds/babies suddenly do something different it takes at least a week to adjust, sometimes more.

Belgatos Park

Belgatos Park is located at the south end of Belgatos Road. From the store go east on Blossom Hill Road. Just past Leigh Avenue, turn right on Belgatos Road and follow it to the parking lot at the end. Since the Belgatos Road Sign is small, look for the more noticeable green Mulberry School sign directly below it.

Oka Ponds

We will meet at the gate at the end of Oka Lane. Take Lark Avenue to Oka Road and follow it under Highway 85 to the end. Turn left on Mozart and take an immediate right on Oka Lane. Go to the end of the road and park along the street.

Vasona Lake

We will meet at the gate by the dam on Garden Hill Drive. From Lark Avenue turn onto Garden Hill Drive (opposite the southbound 880 Lark Avenue Exit) then veer to the right at the fork in the road. Meet at the gate at the next bend in the road (before you get to the Santa Clara County Department of Recreation and Youth Science Institute buildings).

Services Available from the Los Gatos Birdwatcher

- **Feeder Cleaning** – Drop off your feeders any day of the week. We clean on Mondays and Thursdays, asking only a donation to one of four charities (Wildlife Center of Silicon Valley, Wildlife Education and Rehabilitation Center, Nike Animal Rescue Foundation, and Friends of San Martin Animal Shelter). If possible, please bring your feeders in early in the day. We will call you by closing for pickup.

- **Frequent Buyer Program**, buy 9 bags 20# or higher of the same seed and get the 10th one free. Coupons do not apply.

- **Seed Delivery** in the local area, free for over \$40 total, \$4 charge for under \$40 total. Available on Tuesdays (northern route, e.g. Los Altos, Sunnyvale, Mountain View, Cupertino, Saratoga) and Fridays (southern and eastern route, e.g. San Jose, Campbell, Santa Clara.) Los Gatos delivery can be done either day.

- **Monthly children’s nature programs** and children’s programs for pre-schools through 3rd grade. Also great for scout troops. For more information, ask for our new “Educational Programs Insiders Info” Sheet.

- **Outreach to community organizations** about birding. We have birding and “Show and Tell” programs ideal for gardening and other service groups.

- **Backyard Bird Consulting Program** - Freddy will come out and see what you have, what you want, and what might work. The consultation is about an hour and the cost is \$20, which will be applied to any purchase of new feeders, seed, baths, or hardware.

- **Birthday parties with Build a Seed Feeder workshop.** Bring 11 of your friends to the **Los Gatos Birdwatcher** (or at your desired location) and build a birdfeeder. Learn about the different birds that are likely to come to the small hopper feeder that you construct from a pre-cut wooden kit. (Includes a packet of seed, use of tools, and instruction.) *Cost:* \$15 instructor fee + \$10/child (availability may be limited)

Let's Go Birding with Lisa Myers and look for California Condors

Saturday, July 20, 2013 – 8am to 5pm

During the heat of a California summer, birding can get slow. Birds stay out of the heat and birders have a more difficult time finding their feathered targets. So we'll head over to the coast where temperatures are enjoyable, the views are incredible and we'll be looking for California Condors on our way south to the Big Sur area. We'll stop along the way and check out riparian creek sides, tall redwood forests, rolling woodlands, coastal cliffs and kelp beds. Donations towards the conservation of California Condors will be welcomed and matched up to \$100.

Let's Go Birding and Batting with Lisa Myers to the Yolo Bypass.

Saturday, August 17, 2013 – 11:00am to 10:00pm

This trip was such a success last year that we had to do it again! The Yolo Bypass open space provides important habitat for many different species of birds throughout the year, but each summer, the concrete bypass itself is home to roughly 250,000 Mexican free-tail bats, which may make it the largest colony of Mexican free-tail bats in the state. These bats are migratory and return to California each June to birth their pups and spend the summer. We'll spend the afternoon birding the open spaces around the bypass and we'll remain until the 7:58pm sunset. It is at sunset we'll be able to witness thousands of bats heading out for their evening forage of insects. We may also find a few owls during this time. Last year we saw a pair of barn owls making passes over an open field and Swainson's hawks waiting as the bats flew out. A portion of today's proceeds will be donated to NorCalBats.org.
