Great Backyard Bird Count February 17–20, 2017

Launched in 1998 by the Cornell Lab of Ornithology and National Audubon Society, the Great Backyard Bird Count was the first online citizen-science project to collect data on wild birds and to display results in near real-time. Now, more than 160,000 people of all ages and walks of life worldwide join the four-day count each February to create an annual snapshot of the distribution and abundance of birds.

HOW TO COUNT THE BIRDS

You can count birds anywhere you like. We recommend at LEAST 15 minutes—or even longer if you wish. Keep track of the numbers and species of birds you see



and how long you watched. Make your best estimate of how many birds you saw of each species.
For example, 2 American Robins, 7 American Crows. Huge flocks may be a challenge, but your best guess is still valuable. Enter your list(s) online at **BirdCount.org**.

- for each new day
- for each different location
- for the same location, same day, if you counted at a different time of day

Note: Look for the "Submit Observations" tab on the Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC) or eBird website. You can start entering bird lists at midnight local time on the first day of the count from anywhere in the world. If you want to enter your list via eBird, refer to **gbbc.birdcount.org** for instructions on how to set up your eBird account. Have fun!

Saturday Morning Local Bird Walks FREE

Join us most Saturday mornings for an enjoyable bird walk. You can meet at the Los Gatos Birdwatcher at 8:00 am, or meet at the trip location by 8:30 am. Walks end by 10:00 am. • Frequent Buyer Program – Buy 9 of the same seed bags of 15# or higher at full price and get the 10th bag free. Coupons do not apply.

• **Home Delivery** - If getting into the store proves to be a hardship for you, we will deliver seed to your home. Your order must be a minimum of \$40 to receive free delivery. If your order is below \$40, there will be a handling fee of \$8 added to your total. Call the store for details.

• Backyard Bird Consulting Program – We will come out to your home and talk about what you can do to attract more birds to your yard. What species you can attract, where to set-up feeders, bird baths and nest boxes are just some of the topics we'll cover. There is a \$25 consultation fee per visit. With your visit you'll receive a \$10 Los Gatos Birdwatcher coupon. • **15% off one item** – The newsletter coupon is available every two months. You don't have to bring in the physical coupon, but you do have to let us know at the time of the sale that you would like to use it. One coupon per household. Coupons are not applied automatically. Keeping Feeders Clean in Winter – Changes for the Wet and Cold Season

During this time of the year our backyard birds really appreciate the food we provide and you probably notice them eating more. The added food provides calories and energy which helps your birds maintain during the colder days. We want to help you maintain your feeders and food during the cold season. **Here are some tips:** Monitor your seed. If you use "hulled" (without shell) seed it is susceptible to absorbing moisture. So when refilling your feeder, be sure to empty out any leftovers; if allowed to build up, this hulled seed can become a hard cake that can grow mold. Understandably, mold is not good for your birds.

You may consider switching to seeds with shells this time of year. The outer shell helps to protect the seed during wet months. If you have tube feeders, we suggest you fill them half as full - twice as often so all the seed gets eaten quickly before re-filling. If you have a mesh Nyjer/thistle feeder, shake the seed up and down in the feeder on a daily basis when it's raining. This moves the seed around and gets air into the feeder. You can also add suet to your backyard program, or add baffles/rain guards to help keep the rain off feeders.



Keeping feeders clean is an important part of a good feeding program. We sell a non-toxic, safe product designed especially for keeping birdhouses & feeders clean. We'd be happy to show it to you the next time you are in the store. We also provide a complimentary cleaning service, and while staff is happy to clean your feeders for free we do ask that you make a minimum donation of \$5 or more per feeder to one of the Bay Area charities we support. We have donation boxes for the Youth Science

Institute, Injured & Orphaned Wildlife, Wildlife Education and Rehab Center WERC, Wildlife Center of Silicon Valley, Nike Animal Rescue Foundation, and Friends of the San Martin Animal Shelter inside the store.

We now clean feeders on **Tuesday and Thursday**. You are welcome to bring your feeders into the store anytime during the week and we will let you know when they will be ready for pick-up.

In 2016 the Los Gatos Birdwatcher cleaned over 350 feeders and raised nearly \$2000 for local non-profits. We want to thank our customers for being responsible about their backyard bird feeding and allowing us to help.
