Our Feathered Friends Are Getting Ready to Nest Here's how you can help.

Habitat is the single most critical factor for successfully attracting certain bird species to nest in your yard. The kinds of trees and vegetation, both on and near your property, will determine what kinds of birds will nest on your property. Some birds, like sparrows, towhees and juncos nest directly on the ground, so they need a safe place to hide underneath garden shrubs. Other birds, like doves, robins and orioles, will make their nests up in the trees

using branches or mud and even plant fibers. Then there are the birds that require cavities in trees where they'll make their nests. They include woodpeckers, chickadees, titmice, Violet-Green Swallows and wrens. If you do not have natural cavities in your yard you can offer them a man-made nest box as a substitute. We have several different nest box styles and sizes. Our staff is happy to help you pick out a nest box for your backyard habitat.

The Bird School Project by Darrow Feldstein

A small group of middle school students are led outside their classroom door in the middle of science class and they are asked to take a moment in silence to simply listen for different bird sounds. After about thirty seconds, a young girl opens her eyes wide and whispers, "I had no idea there were so many birds here!" This



experiences outside the walls of the classroom. The Bird School Project believes that every student, if provided with the right tools and guidance, has the ability to turn their schoolyard into a living laboratory and the opportunity to develop an understanding and awareness of their local

is the beginning of an important journey toward a deepening connection with her environment. The Bird School Project (BSP) is a local environmental education program in the Monterey Bay that seeks to provide experiences like this to thousands of students each year.

Back in 2014, Kevin Condon and Darrow Feldstein, both recent environmental studies graduates from UC Santa Cruz, set out to share their birding skills with a younger audience. They bought 24 pairs of binoculars, borrowed some bird specimens from the university natural history museum, and set out on bicycles to travel the entire California coast to teach kids about local birds in the schoolyard. Three years and over 3,000 students later, The Bird School Project is a successful education program perpetuating the educators' dreams of helping young people connect deeply with their local birds.

Some schools have the opportunity to attend a residential outdoor school or to have a scientist visit their classroom. However, many schools, due to limited resources are prevented from providing deep environmental educational birds. If the older generation hopes to inspire a younger generation to become stewards of the earth, we need to show students that there are beautiful birds and natural mysteries right in their backyards.

BSP brings binoculars and field journals into every class and guides students into the schoolyard to go birding. Students are taught how to take notes, draw field sketches, identify birds, and contribute to citizen science projects like eBird. BSP is an ambassador program to The Cornell Lab of Ornithology and to the Ken Norris Center for Natural History at UC Santa Cruz.

In order to keep the program soaring and allow it to grow, The Bird School Project is seeking support from anyone and everyone--particularly local birders who care about the future of our birds. Beginning Birding Workshop with Lisa Myers Wednesday, March 15, 2017 6:30 – 8:00 PM at the store & Saturday, March 18 8:00 – 11:00 AM field trip This workshop includes one evening lecture in the store and a Saturday morning field trip. We will talk about what it takes to get into birding from

Back by popular demand, Raptor expert Ryan Phillips will concentrate on the spring time activities of Northern California's breeding raptors. Ryan will discuss the different raptor families - eagles, buteos, accipiters, harriers and falcons. Lisa Myers will also be there to help with birding activities.

Henry Cowell Redwoods State Park Saturday, May 13, 8:00 AM – 4:00 PM

Henry Cowell Redwoods State Park is located in the Santa Cruz Mountains and is most famous for the 40acre grove of towering old-growth redwood trees. These trees also inspired some of California's earliest redwood preservation efforts. This mountain habitat offers species we do not get on the valley floor including Allen's Hummingbirds, Pileated Woodpeckers, Swainson's Thrush, Wilson's Warbler, Black-throated Gray Warbler, Brown Creeper and Pacific Wren. This tour will consist of walking level trails in this park. We'll also stop at the visitor's center. Biologist Ryan Phillips will help Lisa colead this tour. Call the store to reserve your seat. **\$65 and includes park entrance fee and transportation**

A Change in the Season!

You will notice a change in bird plumages and notice an increase in bird song as males sing to attract a female. There will also be a change in your backyard bird species as many of the species that wintered with you will soon migrate away to their breeding grounds in the north and east. This also means we'll be seeing a return of the birds that wintered elsewhere and will now migrate back to feed and, or nest in your neighborhood.

How you can help nesting birds in your yard

- Before you trim shrubs or trees, make sure there are no active nests hidden within
- Keep cats inside; they are the number one killer of birds throughout the world
- Be careful not to use pesticides near nests or on a potential food source
- Keep water and food sources available and clean

If you find a baby bird

If you find what you think is an orphaned baby on the ground, we encourage you to leave it alone and watch from a distance to see if its parents come down to feed it. Several different species of birds actually leave the nest a few days



before they can fly. Their parents will come down to feed and care for them until they can fly. If you have determined your baby bird is in danger and is too young to fend for itself it is OK to pick up the bird, place it in a box and then call a rescue organization for assistance.


• Frequent Buyer Program – Buy 9 of the same seed bags of 15# or higher at full price and get the 10th bag free. Coupons do not apply.

• Home Delivery - If getting into the store proves to be a hardship for you, we will deliver seed to your home. Your order must be a minimum of \$40 to receive free delivery. If your order is below \$40, there will be a handling fee of \$8 added to your total. Call the store for details.

• Backyard Bird Consulting Program – We will come out to your home and talk about what you can do to attract more birds to your yard. What species you can attract, where to set-up feeders, bird baths and nest boxes are just some of the topics we'll cover. There is a \$25 consultation fee per visit.
