

How Do You Keep Cats Out of Your Bird Habitat?

Below is the feedback we received from customers

We are asked by customers all the time how to save backyard birds from unwanted cats that enter their property. In our last newsletter we asked folks what they do to save birds and discourage cats. Here is what they said.



“I cut up orange or green plastic temporary fencing, and attach it to the base of the feeder such that it protrudes several inches from the feeder base on all sides. The cat can’t jump up & snag a feeding bird.”

“I scatter seed in our back garden walk-way. We edged the walk-way with low garden fencing. In the past the neighbor’s cats would hide in the shrubs that line the walk-way. Now they have to leap over the fence and the extra time it takes for the cats to clear the fence is enough time for the birds to escape.”

“I placed the “Cat Scat Mat” on the ground under my feeders. It’s a roll of flexible plastic spikes in mat form that won’t hurt the cat, but is uncomfortable under their paws. This keeps the cats from sitting below my feeding station.”

“I hang my feeders from poles that I place in the middle of my yard. There is no place for a cat to hide.”

“I caught my neighbor’s cat and put bells on it. The cat’s owner took the bells off. So I now feed the cat in the back of my yard. The cat is getting so fat it no longer hunts my birds.”

“Over the years I have found that the best way to get rid of cats in my yard is to trap them and take them to the

Santa Clara Humane Society. They check for a chip and call the owners. There is a charge to retrieve their pets. The charge encourages cat owners to keep a closer watch on their cats.”

“I placed an old metal portable dog crate underneath our tube feeder. It serves as fencing around the ground underneath the feeder. If seed falls to the ground below the feeder, the birds can eat the seed within the walls of the dog crate without being vulnerable to pouncing cats.”

“I catch the cat in a humane cat trap and return the cat to its owners. I ask them to please keep their cat in their yard. If I catch the cat several times I take it to the Humane Society and provide them with the address where the cat lives. The owners are then called. After a few visits they work harder to keep their cat inside their own yard.”

“I spray the cat with water. It does not hurt them, but they run back home. Sometimes I mix mouthwash with the water. This does not hurt the cat, but they do not like the smell.”

“I just let our dogs outside and they chase the cat away.”

“We installed a “scarecrow sprinkler” near our feeders. It is activated by movement. If a cat walks near the sprinkler it is activated and it scares the cat out of the yard. It can also scare other unwanted animals like raccoons, etc.”



“We wrapped our bird bath with chicken wire. So there is a wall of wire around the bath. The birds can still fly in and safely drink and bathe without the fear of a cat pouncing.”

Peregrine Falcons Hanging Out In Campbell – PBRG update

Did you know you can often find Peregrine Falcons sitting on the railings of the city of Campbell’s water tower? Its true! Located in downtown Campbell, the water tower is visible from miles around and serves as a great perch for a falcon. It is always exciting to see a Peregrine Falcon and their presence on the water tower has not gone unnoticed. The Predatory Bird Research Group (PBRG) in partnership with UC Santa Cruz has recently placed a nest box on the water tower’s platform.

The folks at PBRG were aware that a pair of Peregrine Falcons has frequented this structure, and hoped that by placing the nest box in this Campbell location these birds, once on the endangered species list, might be encouraged to use it this breeding season. The PBRG mission: “To use the example of the Peregrine Falcon recovery as an inspiration for tackling today’s environmental challenges, and to involve students and citizen scientists in monitoring the current status of predatory birds in California.” Because the water tower is so easy to access and observe, PBRG hoped that members of our bird watching community would be able to assist by reporting any falcon activities they observed. 



Birding-by-Ear Workshop


Wednesday morning May 8 • 10:00 – 12:00

Owls are mysterious birds usually found only at night as they hunt after dark in search of rodents. Because of that we have created a wonderful class.



Services Available from the Los Gatos Birdwatcher

- **Feeder Cleaning** – We want to help you maintain a healthy environment for your backyard birds. That is why we offer this service to clean feeders on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Bring your feeder into the store in the morning and we'll have it ready before closing. While we clean feeders for free we do ask that you consider making a minimum donation of \$5 per feeder to one of the Bay Area charities we support. You'll find collection boxes at the store.
- **Frequent Buyer Program** – Buy 9 of the same seed bags of 20# or higher at full price and get the 10th bag free. Coupons do not apply.
- **Outreach to community organizations about birding** – We have educational programs about birds and birding, ideal for gardening and other service groups.
- **Backyard Bird Consulting Program** – We will come out to your home and talk about what you can do to attract more birds to your yard. What species you can attract, where to set-up feeders, bird baths and nest boxes are just some of the topics we'll cover. There is a \$25 consultation fee per visit. With your visit you'll receive a \$10 Los Gatos Birdwatcher gift certificate.
- **Help you to ID your Birds** – We can help you ID that mystery bird in your yard. Just take a photo using your cell phone and email it to info@losgatosbirdwatcher.com, or drop by the store and show your photo to our staff.

If You Find A Baby Bird

If you find what you think is an orphaned baby bird on the ground, we encourage you to leave it alone and watch from a distance to see if its parents come down to feed it. Several different species of birds actually leave the nest a few days before they can fly. They hide in the bushes while their parents come down to feed and care for them until they can fly. However, if you have determined your baby bird is in danger and is too young to fend for itself, it is OK to pick up the bird, place it in a box and then call a rescue organization for assistance.
