to protect them. This knowledge is then used to make conservation decisions. As we better understand where the birds are going we learn what areas are vital to their success.





If You Find A Baby Bird

"Eighty percent of baby birds that come into a rescue have basically just been kidnapped," says Melanie Furr, education director at the Atlanta Audubon Society and a licensed rescue volunteer. "They need to be taken back. Wandering from the nest is exactly what fledglings—which are just learning to fly—are supposed to do," she says. "It's a normal part of a bird's development, and though these chicks might appear abandoned, they're likely under surveillance by their parents nearby". However, if you have determined your baby bird is in danger and is too young to fend for itself, it is OK to pick up the bird, place it in a box and then call a rescue organization for assistance. You can refer to our home page for rescue organizations.

Bird ID Workshops – Open to all levels

These workshops have proven extremely popular as customers learn how to identify the birds coming to their yards and into the Bay Area. Workshops take place at the Los Gatos Birdwatcher 7:00 – 8:00 PM (free). These one hour workshops will focus on four different bird species. We'll go over the field marks you can use to make the ID. Spring is the time of year that birds really start to sing. It's about finding a mate and declaring territory and all the things a busy bird needs to do during the breeding season. They say developing chicks in the egg can hear the songs happening on the other side of the egg shell and they recognize their parent's song even before they hatch. Many of you wish you could identify your birds by their song so this workshop is for you.

The workshop will be a little different as we do a "big sit". We will sit in one location and note how many different species we hear. The workshop will be at Guadalupe Oak Grove Park where we will be away from city and street noise. It will be a learning exercise in observation with our ears! We'll be listening for Northern Mockingbird, Bewick's Wren, Mourning Dove, Spotted Towhee, Oak Titmouse, White-Breasted Nuthatch, California Thrasher, Red-shouldered Hawk, California Scrub Jay, Nuttall's Woodpecker, Cedar Waxwings, Northern Flicker, Swallows and more. Kids Helping Condors, One Piece of Litter at a Time

One day a very outgoing, enthusiastic young lady came into the store with her mother and asked if we would display a sign in our window that told about the California Condors. I shared with her that we love condors and asked the nine-year-old Celestine what she was doing to help the condors? This is what she said.

LG Birdwatcher: Celestine, how did you learn about the condors?

CC: I've been traveling to Big Sur since I was a baby. On one visit, I saw a display about condors at the Big Sur Lodge. It talked about the issues that threaten condors—and all wildlife. I've always loved and wanted to protect animals, so I wanted to help. I went back to my cabin and started making a lot of signs about



condors and how their chicks are harmed by micro-litter. I took these signs to near-by restaurants and asked them if they would hang them in their windows and they all said yes. That's how it started two years ago.

LG Birdwatcher: That's wonderful! When we met, you mentioned your Condor Scouts. Tell us about that group and how it started.

CC: During that trip, a waitress at Big Sur Bakery told me about the Ventana Wildlife Society—a group that works to bring back the California Condor population. She said they had a webcam I could watch to see a condor chick in its nest. That was it! For months I watched a chick named "Pasquale". I was determined to do something to help. I told a few friends asked them to help me pick up litter. The next thing you know, my friends in the neighborhood and at my martial art school were picking up litter every day. It only takes a few minutes, and we collect piles of junk and micro-liter. We decided to call ourselves "The Condor Scouts".

LG Birdwatcher: Do your Condor Scouts have any other activities besides picking up litter?

CC: Yes! Lots of things. I asked Ventana Wildlife Society if I could be a volunteer for them, and they gave me a nice VWS bag full of their flyers about what they do. I carry that bag around town while wearing my Condor Scouts hat, and anyone who asks me about my hat... they get a flyer and the condor story! I also asked my mother if I could study wildlife biology and specifically ornithology, so I've been learning nonstop about birds. I'm doing an unofficial Big Year this year, and I've already seen more than 60 species, including golden eagles, bald eagles, yellow-billed magpies, American kestrels, a peregrine falcon, a great blue heron, snowy egret, and many more beauties! I visit Ventana Wildlife Society and The Los Gatos Birdwatcher for their events as much as possible to learn more, and to be around other people who love birds and are helping them.

Our New Compostable Bag Is A Success!

To offer more options for our customers, we take our 20, 25 and 40 pound bags of seed and manually re-bag the seed it into smaller quantities. For many months we have been trying to come up with an acceptable alternative to the plastic bags we were previously using. We tried many unsuccessful options until we found the "Zenith Natural Z" solution!

This new bag is made from a variety of recycled, compostable and biodegradable papers. The bag is lined with polylactic acid (PLA] which is a corn-based polymer and keeps the seed oils from seeping through the bag. And these new bags are 100% compostable. We are excited about our new find and have been getting positive feedback! We are proud to be able to offer a green packaging solution, and help be a part of the recycling and composting programs.
