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Photo Contest Winners

This was the first time the Los Gatos Birdwatcher sponsored a photo contest. It was our way to celebrate Earth Day during the pandemic when many were staying close to home. Our birdwatcher community, all amateur photographers, emailed us nearly 100 different images. We had to narrow it down to twelve final photographs which will all be included in our first Los Gatos Birdwatcher calendar. Everyone on staff looked at the subject matter, composition and focus of each photograph and votes were then tallied. It was not easy picking twelves winners let alone the top three. The top three photographs are featured for you below and are of species we often talk about here in the store. Ironically all three photographs were taken in each person's own yard. *First place won a \$500 gift card* to the store, second place won a *\$250 gift card* and *third place won a \$100 gift card*. We want to thank everyone that took the time to enter our photo contest and congratulate the winners.





1st Place Anna's Hummingbird Nest - Scott Hooper

Equipment - Sony A7R3 with an FE 100-400mm f/4.5-5.6 GM OSS zoom lens and a 2x.

"This hummingbird nest was built in an orange tree located in the shade of an Avocado Tree in our Santa Clara yard. I set up a folding ladder about 13 feet away and was particularly careful to keep far enough from the nest so that the momma hummingbird would approach the babies without hesitation. We watched the process all the way until both chicks fledged."



2nd Place Two Oriole Day - Stega (LC Boros)

Equipment - Canon EOS 5D Mark IV with a 100-400mm f4.5-5.6L IS II USM lens.

"Photographed through my office window, we had a Bullock's Oriole bathing in the foreground while a Hooded Oriole waited for his turn. We had at least five breeding pairs of orioles this year. This was a huge change from a couple of years ago because we carefully re-landscaped a barren section of our unincorporated San Jose yard into a beautifully planted garden."



3rd Place Great-horned Owl on the roof - Malcolm Bramwell

Equipment - Nikon D5500 and a Nikon telephoto 70 to 300mm lens, at 300mm, ISO 1250, 1/125th second. f5.6.

"We felt this was quite the indigent look this Great-horned Owl gave us as it waited for the sunset. The owl arrived and stayed on our San Jose roof for about half an hour waiting for it to get dark enough to go hunting. While there its gaze switched between me and our cat Snooks who was equally interested in the owl."

The Breeding Season

- Helping Wild Birds Succeed

A few years ago research revealed the number of birds in North America is down over 2.9 billion breeding adults since the 1970s. The only way we can turn this around is if we work together with nature. The breeding season arrives each Spring, and neighborhoods come alive with bird song and courtship. If birds are not able to successfully breed during this time, their numbers decline. We can help birds increase their numbers if we work together. The Los Gatos Birdwatcher gets many phone calls during this time as people have questions about the birds and nests they find. Here are a few local success stories from this 2021 breeding season.

Dead Trees Make Great Birdhouses

- Did you know that dead trees are often alive with wildlife? Bugs will work on the dead bark, and holes in dead trunks provide great places to nest. At Vasona County Park, this dead tree became the ideal location to raise a family of mosquito-eating Tree Swallows!



However, at this time, as we continue to try and keep seed on the shelf, you will continue to see both paper and plastic when picking up your seed. We ask for your patience. Thank you!

Do You Have Toxic Nandina In Your Yard?

Many of us are familiar with a common shrub known as Nandina. It is also called Sacred Bamboo or Heavenly Bamboo. It is a non-native, introduced plant that can be found in our own yards or as a common plant used in commercial landscaping. It has been around for decades and gardeners are still planting them today, but did you know that the red berries produced from this plant can be deadly?

Nandina berries contain cyanide and other alkaloids that produce highly toxic hydrogen cyanide (HCN) which is extremely poisonous to all animals from fruit eating birds like Cedar Waxwings, and American Robins to dogs and cats. We encourage you not to plant this species in your yard. If you already have this plant on your property and do not want to remove it, we encourage you to prune the berries as soon as you see them start to grow so they will not be eaten by an unsuspecting animal.
