

Lisa Myers' Duck Workshop

Class: Thursday, January 24, 2013, 6:30 to 8:00pm Field Trip: Saturday, January 26, 9:00-11:00am

Ducks are a fabulous group of birds. They are large enough to find, easy to observe, and come in many different plumages from the colorful wood ducks to the dapper Gadwalls. Some ducks dive for their food as they eat fish, mollusks, and shellfish, while others dabble on the surface finding insects and vegetation. Some ducks make their home in the ocean while here in the Bay Area we can see over twenty different species of ducks. We'll review 25 different species of ducks to help you identify them all.

Winter Tips

You can hang up seed ornament and other treats or put out seed blocks, nuts, and black oil sunflower. For the ground feeders here until February, scatter millet on the ground under the bushes or hang our millet sprays on the lower branches. Flocking behavior by pine siskins and goldfinches adds to the risk of disease (see irruptive year article below). Hang more prefilled thistle feeders to spread the flocky birds out and to reduce the threat of disease. Fill your feeders late in day so birds have food available just before nightfall and at daybreak, when birds need a boost after the long cold night. Add suet feeders to give the birds more fat to keep them warm. If it is raining long and hard, consider taking your feeders in at night.

Use baffles for squirrels, weather protection and cleanliness.

Baffles just aren't to prevent squirrels from getting on your feeders, they do a great job at keeping the top of the feeder clean of bird droppings and help in keeping the feeder dry in the rain. If there is wind with the rain, no baffle will prevent rain from getting into the seed.

There are many different shapes and sizes when it comes to baffles. The smallest is 12" in diameter and works best for hummingbird feeders, suet feeders, and small seed feeders. The 12" size doesn't always work as a squirrel deterrent, though. The next size up is 16" and works better to ward off squirrels and does well against rain. We carry a plastic style and a metal leaf pattern that looks good in the yard. The next size up is the 20" and when placed the requisite six to eight feet away from a side launch point, it does an excellent job against squirrels.

There are also several different styles of baffles. Those that sit on the top of the feeder with the bail or hanger going through a hole in the baffle work well if the weight of the

baffle does not interfere
with the feeder (not
acceptable for the Buster
mini or the Buster Classic).
Another style that is a favorite
of employee, KC Harris, is the
Mandarin baffle (AKA Witch's Hat)
which is highly adjustable and
sends the squirrels flying.

During the rainy season we encourage people to be careful of the seed in the feeders and to guard against mold and fungus. One trick is to never put dry seed over wet. Always dump out the wet seed at the bottom. If it isn't moldy, it can be spread on the ground for the ground feeders. You will hear us say to customers – fill half as full twice as often – many times during the rainy season.

Irruptive year for Pine Siskins-Salmonella comes with it.

One of our occasional winter visitors is the Pine Siskin. Their normal year-round territory is northern US and Canada. Every three to five years three things happen and we get a huge number of them coming south to this area for the winter. There is an overpopulation, then low food availability, and finally

availability, and finally early cold weather.
When this phenomenon happens, these flocky little birds head south where it's warmer and where there is more food.
Unfortunately,

Unfortunately,
this usually leads
to outbreaks of salmonella,
especially when it is rainy as it has

been, that causes pine siskins and their close cousins, the goldfinches, to puff up, become lethargic, and usually die fairly quickly. If you find a dead bird, take a plastic bag and put it over your hand, pick up the bird, then pull the bag over the bird and dispose of, thanking them for the joy they give.

How can you help?
Wearing gloves, clean
your feeders with white
vinegar, a soy enzyme
cleaner, or a bleach
solution if you see a
"puff" bird. We


clean feeders on Monday and Thursday asking only a donation to one of our four charities. Again, wearing gloves, clean off any build-up of droppings under the feeders as well. Adding a baffle to the top keeps some of the droppings off the feeder and will help keep things drier in the rain. When it is raining fill your feeders half as full twice as often and don't put dry seed over wet. Also, check under your feeders and rake up and dispose of any build up of soggy or moldy seed. You can also spray our seed and hull digester onto the ground to hasten its disintegration.

New Books On The Shelves

Bay Area Birds, from
Sonoma County to
Monterey Bay by
David Lukas is a great
companion book to any
field identification guide.
No pictures or photos,
just well researched
information about each

species "Life History", status, and range information. In my personal study of birds and in fielding questions from customers, I have scoured many field guides and books for rather esoteric information. This book is now on our reference shelf as it has answered several questions already. I had read that male marsh wrens built several nests for the female to choose from. According to Lukas it is more like "they build 20 "dummy" nests to decieve nest predetors but also indicates the male's vigor to prospective mates." Another fact that I didn't know was that these "cute" little birds that are full of 200 types of songs, are also "intensely competitive whereby both males and females seek out and destroy eggs and nestlings in every nest they can find,



a behavior that forces other marsh birds, like blackbirds, to nest in groups. In one study up to 50 percent of all red-winged blackbird nest failed due to marsh wrens." This 300 page book, that fits easily in most packs, contains descriptions of 320 species that occur in

the Bay Area, including migrants and seabirds. *Price*: \$21.95

Room to Breathe,

The Wild Heart of the San Francisoco Peninsula edited by Kristi Britt is the celebration of forty years of preserving open space that is

published in collaboration with the Midpeninsula Regional Open Space District (MROSD). Forty years ago a group of visionaries created MROSD to protect the hills and valleys of the San Francisco Peninsula from teeming residential development. There is a map in the preface that shows all of the preserves under MROSD's jurisdiction combined with their

mission statement. Following these are paintings, photographs, and poems about the various preserves. Longtime customer and accomplished artist, Laurie Barna, introduced us to this book because her work is featured on page 49. Laurie's wonderful watercolor on tissue paper was of Boris, now Boris-a, an ambassador bird from a Hayward wildlife rehabilitation center. Each artist was asked to also write a paragraph about

their art and Laurie told of a "meeting a number of rescued birds from the Sulphur Creek Nature Center at an educational event." That was an event that we put on with our educational

coordinator, Christine Wolf, who is the pre-school director and handler for Sulphur Creek. Customers Jim Liskovec and Karen DeMello are also featured in the book. Through photos and paintings one can experience the many faces of MROSD, but there is nothing like getting out and experiencing them first hand.


