With Love & Thanks for 20 Years

October 14, 2015, marked twenty years of "The Bird Store." When John and I decided to do this crazy thing called retail, we looked into two franchises for help in figuring it all out. We chose Wild Bird Centers of America (WBCA), which at the time was a dynamic company with lots of great products, seed mixes and ideas about kids' programs, bird walks, and outreach. It was a great match for many years, but things changed, and we disagreed with their direction. We changed the name of our store to "Los Gatos Birdwatcher"

and went independent in 2010. Except for the color of the counters and the walls, most customers didn't notice a thing, and that was the whole reason for our going independent – to keep our products, especially seed, of high quality and right for our birds found in the west. Through the years, we have had a great time teaching people about birds, learning from their experiences, and sharing their excitement when the feeders and seed we helped them choose brought in the birds! Photos and stories about special sightings, funny antics, and the joy of watching the birds have all been high points. Saturday morning birdwalks have always been a highlight in the



store's history and for me. Without them I probably would have been hunched over a computer and not connected to the birds and people that make everything worthwhile. I led the store's first walk in December 1995. I remember it vividly. It was attended by three people: Jan Aplustill, Beth McGillis and Jan

Winterfield who for years came out on my walks; all are gone now. Through the decades these walks have had regular attendees and we are always meeting new people



who come out to learn about birding. We've discovered and explored parks and "birdie spots" all over the county. As regular Matt Rode has said many times, "I've lived here for forty years, and I've never been to this place."

On the third Saturday of most months, guest field trip leaders took us to amazing places farther afield such as the Sacramento Wildlife Refuge, Santa Cruz's Nicene Marks and California's Central Valley for wintering waterfowl. Now, Lisa Myers (Let's Go Birding, Inc.) takes us in style and safety by professional tour bus with the "Birdaloo" in tow. We bird places such as Panoche Valley

in search of Mountain Plovers, Merced for cranes, Big Sur for condors, and Mines Road and Lone Tree Road for migrants.

Educating the community about birds is an important goal of the store, but I have always been passionate in being able to also work with children to teach them about nature. As part of our outreach, "Miss Christine" and I designed children's programs that we conduct in area schools, and in the store. Last year we taught over 1400 local school children about nature. Students learned about the different kinds of birds, the benefit of bats, animal tracks, weather and much more. After John and I retire, and we get settled into our new home, I hope to be able to bring these programs to the children around Templeton.

I have also enjoyed getting to know many of you through the "Show and Tell" programs I have presented to organizations around the bay (Rotary, Kiwanis,



PEO, SIRS, garden clubs, Live Oak Adult Day Services, etc.) In addition, experts have conduced educational workshops we have sponsored here at the store and next door in cooperation with The Terraces.

That means all on one floor, a kitchen to meet all of John's specifications, gray water system, native landscaping, and a craft room for me, a workshop for John, and a guest room. The house will be built in about a year. We have always loved the Central Coast and are looking forward to birding Morro Bay, sipping wine in over 300 wineries and sampling the delicious food in the many great eateries. Joann Thompson kept me on the straight and narrow about HR rules, Joan Graham delighted in everyone's bird stories, Judy Bingman reconnected with all her students, and Jared Lockhart charmed everyone by giving his conyer "Cherry" her Sunday bath in a drinking cup. Some of the early "high schoolers" were Angie Adams, Carrie Awalt, Scott Robbins and Misty Buckley who are now all grown up, all married, two with kids

Hello from Lisa Myers

I asked Freddy for an "Informational Interview" shortly after she opened the "bird store". I had always wanted my career to involve nature and helping people learn about the environment and Freddy's store epitomized that dream. She was kind enough to meet me and



answer my questions about what it took to operate such a store. That was nearly 20 years ago. I realized it was going to be more than I could handle at that stage of my life, but after talking with Freddy, I was inspired and I also made a new friend. Although we did not know it at the time, that was also the beginning of a birding partnership.

In the following years I started my own birding tour company called Let's Go Birding. My goal was to get adults outside to learn about birds and birding. I wanted to create a friendly environment where all birding levels were welcome. I also wanted to bring a little humor to a hobby that at times could get a bit intimidating. Folks could ask all kinds of questions without judgement. I wanted to make a positive impact on the environment and I wanted to help others do the same thing. Freddy felt the same way. We knew there was a population of birders that while they had a passion for nature and birds, they were not necessarily interested in memorizing the taxonomic order of all the birds found in the world. So we formed a partnership. I brainstormed with Freddy on ideas for her store and she taught me about her store. She also provided me with the opportunity to teach and I have led roughly 60 birding tours for the Los Gatos Birdwatcher to locations all over the greater Bay Area. Freddy reminded me that back in 2004 I told Freddy if she and John ever wanted to sell the store to please let me know. It would be a decade later when she shared with me that she and John were ready to retire and she would like me to take it over. Selling one's business is not easy, but she also did not want to simply close the doors, leaving her customers without quality products and seed. I accepted the offer to purchase the Los Gatos Birdwatcher and my longtime dream of owning such a store would come true. And not just any store, one of the more successful nature stores in the nation!

I also know customers do not want to see Freddy and John go. I don't want to see them go either, but they have worked really, really hard and they deserve to retire and start another chapter. They have agreed to help me however they can after the official transition date of December 1. And while John is working on their new custom house plans, Freddy plans to come birding with us. So please be patient with me as I learn the ropes. My partner Al, retired from the fire department years ago, has been helping around the store and he said he'd like to help me, so you'll meet him too. I look forward to meeting all of you as the next chapter of the Los Gatos Birdwatcher begins.

Tips for the Season

Fall and Winter Feeding - Changes for the Wet and Cold Season

Now is a time that feeding birds takes on a more life supporting role, and if we get the amount of rain we are supposed to, we want to help you to be prepared. Monitoring the seed you have in your feeders is especially important, because when seed gets wet and sits it becomes susceptible to diseases that birds can get and then pass on to each other.

If you have tube feeders, only fill them half as full so the birds rotate through the seed more quickly. You would then fill them twice as often and your birds will thank you. If you use any "hulled" (without shell) seed or mixes you may want to switch to seeds with shells. Seeds without a shell covering are more susceptible to absorbing moisture.

When you do refill your feeders, be sure to empty out the leftovers on the bottom. If left over time it becomes hard to clean and the old seed that accumulates can eventually grow mold.

Add baffles/rain guards to minimize the amount of rain that reaches the seed, thus helping to keep the seed dry and reducing the waste of seed due to mold.

With mesh Nyjer/thistle feeders, shake the seed up and down in the feeder on a daily basis when it's raining. This moves the seed around and gets air into the feeder.

Another tip for Nyjer/thistle feeders is to increase the number of feeders

you have in your yard. This will help to spread the birds out throughout your yard. American and Lesser Goldfinches and Pine Siskins often flock onto the Nyjer/thistle feeders during the winter. Because of this flockiness, they are susceptible to diseases like salmonella. By spreading out several feeders you can reduce the spread of disease.

No matter which type of feeder you have, it is important to clean up any seed that accumulates under the feeder. This means your ground feeders won't end up eating old, wet seed.

Remember to keep your feeders clean. You can do this yourself or bring them into the store and we'd be happy to clean them. See services listed below.

Services Available from the Los Gatos Birdwatcher

- Feeder Cleaning Drop off your feeders any day of the week. We clean on Mondays and Thursdays, asking only a donation to one of six charities (Wildlife Center of Silicon Valley, Wildlife Education and Rehabilitation Center, Nike Animal Rescue Foundation, Friends of San Martin Animal Shelter, Injured and Orphaned Wildlife, and Henry W. Coe State Park Bat Project.). If possible, please bring your feeders in early in the day. We will call you by closing for pickup.
- Frequent Buyer Program, buy 9 bags 20# or higher of the <u>same</u> seed and get the 10th one free. Coupons do not apply.
- Outreach to community organizations about birding. We have birding and "Show and Tell" programs ideal for gardening and other service groups.

- Backyard Bird Consulting Program Lisa will come out and see what you have, what you want, and what might work. The consultation is about an hour and the cost is \$20, which will be applied to any purchase of new feeders, seed, baths, or hardware.
- We offer **Gift Certificates** and our popular "**Drop a Hint**" cards that allow you to choose a selection of gifts you would like (wish list) to be considered and when the gift giver comes in with the list, we know exactly what you want.
- 15% off one item Coupon is available every two months. You don't have to bring in the physical coupon, but you do have to let us know at the time of the sale that you would like to use it. We do not apply the coupon automatically. The coupon excludes optics, trips and sale items.


There will be no Let's Go Birding all day tour in the month of December because everyone is really busy with the holidays.
